In case you missed it, a recent study by German scientists challenges the idea that otherwise healthy adults are bound to experience deteriorating brain function. The study at Tübingen University (located in central Baden-Württemberg about 19 miles south of Stuttgart) found many older people can be slower to recall facts or to learn new information because **their brains are so stuffed with accumulated knowledge** – not because of inevitable cognitive decline. "The brains of older people do not get weak," Michael Ramscar of Tübingen said, "On the contrary, they simply know more."
